

**TURNED UP ALIVE.**—The man, James Larrage, who disappeared last Friday, alarmed his family by his absence, got himself advertised in the papers, and had the Coroners searching the streams for his body—turned up alive last night at his own house. His tale may be briefly told. He got drunk, went abroad of the cars, rode to Syracuse, and thence to Oswego, where his money failed, and he became sober. Mrs. L. very properly went at once to Coroner Brown to inform him of her husband's return, that he might not have any further trouble in searching for his body, living or dead.
